

CALL TO ORDER - PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE - ROLL CALL

Mayor Schroder called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. in the Council Chambers.

PRESENT: Janet Kennedy, Councilmember, Michael Menesini, Councilmember, Mark Ross, Councilmember, Lara DeLaney, Vice Mayor, and Rob Schroder, Mayor.

EXCUSED: None.

ABSENT: None.

PRESENTATION(S)/PROCLAMATION(S)

A. Proposition 84 Nature Education Facilities Grant Update by Tempra Board.

Tempra Board provided an overview and progress of the grant application for the California Center for Delta Research and Education (CCDRE), reviewed eligible applicants, eligible projects, grant program objectives, reviewed the mission of the CCDRE, strengths of the CCDRE project, and the grant application team (City of Martinez, CCDRE, Tempra Board & Associates, and Zumwalt Engineering). She also reviewed progress made on the grant application - development of a timeline and scope of work, three team meetings held (including one with the Department of Parks & Recreation and one with the grant program staff in Oakland), meeting with the consultant engineers, progress on the cost estimate, completion of the first draft of two sections (50%) of the proposal narrative, and other requirements of the application that are on target with the timeline, noting that the application is due July 1. She discussed the next steps in the process: finalizing of the cost estimates and site plan by June 21, revision of the application narrative and completion by June 25, finalizing the application packet and attachment by June 29, and hand-delivery of the application to Sacramento by June 30.

Ms. Board further explained the performance period for the grant, including the approximate dates for the awards announcement, CEQA deadline, contract signing, construction completion, project completion, and when the project performance will end (June 30, 2017).

Vice Mayor DeLaney said she thought this was a great opportunity for the City, citing how well the project meets the goals of the grant, potential jobs, and the short completion period of the process. She expressed appreciation for the historical and economic aspects, and for the added benefit of bringing people to Martinez.

Councilmember Kennedy thanked Ms. Board for the presentation, commenting on the comprehensive nature of the grant as well as other funding possibilities that might become available for the project.

Mayor Schroder asked the potential amount of the grant that could be awarded to the City. Ms. Board indicated that Martinez is in the top tier and the highest amount that could be awarded is \$7 million.

Councilmember Ross commented on the growing awareness of the importance of the environment, in view of the recent oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico.

Councilmember Menesini expressed appreciation for the professionalism exhibited in the approach taken by Ms. Board. He acknowledged there are no guarantees that the proposal will be awarded a grant, but he agreed it would be of great benefit to the City if it happens.

B. Downtown Quiet Zone Update.

City Engineer Tim Tucker gave a brief history of the issue and the conclusion that only the crossings at Berrellessa and Ferry Streets would qualify; as well as the Council's allocation of funds for the completion of a study to evaluate the possibilities. He discussed the qualifications and experience of Wilbur Smith Associates and introduced Justin Fox of Wilbur Smith Associates.

Mr. Fox reviewed the Martinez Railroad Quiet Zone Study, including the purpose of the Study, the study area schematic, existing conditions, and Quiet Zone requirements. He also reviewed the different scenarios under consideration: 1) installation of four-quadrant gates at the Berrellessa and Ferry Street crossings, 2) installation of a four-quadrant gate at Ferry Street but no additional improvements at Berrellessa, and 3) relocation of the Ferry Street crossing to the east and blocking access to the current crossing. He noted that a fourth possibility was developed in response to concerns raised by the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) and the Federal Railroad Association (FRA) to install four-quadrant gates at Berrellessa and relocate the Ferry Street crossing (as described in Option 3).

Mr. Fox discussed cost estimates for options 1 and 4. He also commented on an alternative solution, wayside horns, which are mounted on the pole at each crossing, and the cost advantages, although he noted it would not have the same benefit of reduced noise that establishing a quiet zone would provide. He concluded with a discussion of the next steps in the process.

Councilmember Menesini expressed concern about the increased size of the railroad switch yard and the impact on the City. He asked if there is any way to get the railroad to contribute funds to the quiet zone project. Mr. Fox said it might be worth a try, but it is unlikely. Councilmember Menesini asked, and Mr. Fox confirmed that turning Berrellessa and Ferry Streets one-way would qualify as supplementary safety measures, as long as a one-way loop is formed from one crossing to the next. Councilmember Menesini noted that could be done at considerably less cost to the City.

Mayor Schroder asked for more information about the effectiveness of the wayside horn. Mr. Fox said that the FRA considers it as effective as any other supplementary safety measure.

Mayor Schroder asked whether establishing a quiet zone means there will never be train horns sounded in the City. Mr. Fox said no, and he explained that the train engineer is required to blow his horn anytime he feels the need for safety reasons, regardless of whether there is a quiet zone, and trains that depart the station are required to sound their horns as they leave. Nevertheless, he was confident that a quiet zone would result in significantly less noise from the train horns.

Vice Mayor Lara DeLaney requested copies of the presentation; City Engineer Tim Tucker stated that he would provide copies and place the presentation on the City's website.

Vice Mayor DeLaney questioned whether wayside horns would be required even if other SSMs are implemented at each intersection. She also suggested that installing wayside horns would be a good interim measure. She asked why not use the 4-quad gates at Berrellesa instead of Ferry, if only one intersection was going to be done; she thought the Ferry Street crossing has more traffic.

Mr. Fox commented on the unique complexities of the Berrellesa crossing. Mr. Tucker also added that the FRA clarified that its calculator is a tool for cities to use to evaluate crossings, but the FRA retains final authority in determining what qualifies. Councilmember Menesini noted that the Berrellesa Street crossing has always been an issue because it is an at-grade crossing so close to the next one.

Vice Mayor DeLaney commented that the Port of Oakland is considering expanding its facilities, which will have an impact on the amount of freight that runs through Martinez. She asked whether the City could ask for mitigation from Oakland to help with this type of project. Mr. Tucker indicated that Martinez and other cities did comment during the EIR period of Oakland's project, but he questioned whether it would be feasible for Oakland to financially help each city along the line.

Vice Mayor DeLaney asked whether neighbors' complaints about the Morello trestle have been addressed yet. Mr. Tucker said that was a different train line, and some financial offers have been made to the property owner, which the owner did not consider acceptable. He acknowledged there are probably still some complaints about train noise in the area, but they have lessened somewhat. Councilmember Menesini added that many of those trains are remotely operated, and the operator would be more likely to sound the horn to ensure ultimate safety. Mr. Fox added that type of information would be researched in the diagnostic process.

Vice Mayor DeLaney asked whether the cost estimates were based on current costs. Mr. Fox said yes, but it could be less since there are contingencies built into the design and engineering costs.

Councilmember Ross agreed with Vice Mayor DeLaney about considering wayside horns as an interim solution. He commented on a recent visit to Del Mar, which has trains going through it, but no horns whatsoever.

After further discussion, the Council directed staff to research wayside horns as an interim measure.

Mike Marshall, representing Liberty Patients Collective, spoke on the medical cannabis issue. He stated that he was disappointed that the issue kept being removed from the agenda. He criticized the Public Safety Committee for trying to drag this issue past the elections in

November, which he finds not acceptable. Mr. Marshall handed out information on the impacts of a medical cannabis dispensary. He requested the Council move forward on the matter. Mayor Schroder reminded everyone that the City already has an ordinance allowing medical cannabis dispensaries, and the Public Safety Subcommittee is considering whether it needs to be amended. He noted that it is an issue that deserves full consideration, and he did not think Mr. Marshall's allegations about dragging it out for political reasons were appropriate.

Vice Mayor DeLaney also noted that the matter has not been placed on the agenda and withdrawn - it has never even been on the agenda. The Subcommittee is doing everything it can to move it forward. She was offended that he would imply it was delayed for political reasons.

Councilmember Menesini said the Subcommittee would continue to review the ordinance. He acknowledged that the medical benefits of cannabis are clear, and the question now is how to get it to those who need it for legitimate medical reasons while ensuring public safety.

Mike Alford spoke against the unfair time limits for addressing the Council under the Consent Calendar, and he questioned whether the Brown Act was being followed. He stated he was going to run against the Mayor and would find out about contracts and what happened to the \$1.7 million from the Department of Boating and Waterways.

George Griffin, Laborer's Local 324, spoke on problems with the contracts issued by the City pertaining to the Police parking lot, and indicated several violations including workers compensation issues, and a 14 year old boy who was working, which is against State law. Mr. Griffin wanted to know how the contract was awarded without a competitive bid process and who is responsible. City Manager Phil Vince said he and Public Works Director Dave Scola were aware of the concerns raised and were researching the complaints. Councilmember Menesini expressed appreciation for the seriousness with which Mr. Vince is handling the complaints, noting that the Council is on the record in support of treating workers fairly.

Michael Marshall, member of Liberty Patients Collective, spoke on medical marijuana dispensaries. He stated that the City does have an ordinance but it is drafted in such a way to make it impossible to open a dispensary in Martinez. Mr. Marshall stated that they attempted to go through the old ordinance and were denied their legal due process. He suggested the best way to move forward would be a ballot measure or a lawsuit, rather than moving through the political process.

Jeff Oswald responded on behalf of Labats, and distributed a general prevailing wage determination describing the classifications used, and described how he responded to FFC complaints. Mr. Oswald indicated that the FCC is a non-governmental agency which is funded by the Unions and their sole purpose is to put small, minority-owned, independent, or non-union companies out of business. He has done some research and there have been several complaints filed by FFC, only against non-union companies, three or four of which have gone out of business because they cannot afford to fight the unions and their attorneys. Mr. Oswald said Labats knows the importance of the unions, but understands the importance of the small independent contractors as well. He indicated that Labats is willing to comply with regulations, but does not appreciate the targeting of small independent companies.

Councilmember Ross noted that the bid from Labats was considerably lower than the other bids, which is why some are concerned that they are under-paying their workers and why the matter is under investigation.

Vice Mayor Lara DeLaney requested that Item #8 be pulled from the Consent Calendar. Mayor Schroder opened public comment on Items #1-#7 and #9-#17 of the Consent Calendar.

Bianca McCann urged the Council to reconsider its decision on Item #6, questioning whether a 2-story house is appropriate in that location. She noted a lawsuit will be filed, and she reviewed the issues. Mayor Schroder asked staff whether public information requests are being handled appropriately. Associate Planner Anjana Mepani stated that the request for 87 files was received on Friday, and staff is still determining how long it will take.

Luke McCann also asked the Council to reconsider their decision on the appeal, noting that some who came to the last meeting in support of Mr. Stahlberg were not even residents of the City. He expressed concern about the process followed by the City and whether there might have been some conflict of interest and/or special privilege accorded to Mr. Stahlberg.

Mike Alford noted that most of the houses in the McCann's neighborhood are single-story. He also noted that Mr. Stahlberg was actively soliciting people to speak in support of him at the last meeting, and he has close ties with the downtown business community. He expressed as well that when Mayor Schroder asked for a show of hands those who indicated their support of Mr. Stahlberg were either business owners or non-residents, and he was concerned about the precedent that could be set from this decision. He was also concerned that the project violates the Downtown Specific Plan. He asked the Council to consider the voters in making their decision. Mayor Schroder corrected Mr. Alford, noting the Downtown Specific Plan does not apply to this property.

Carol Raifsnider expressed appreciation to the Council for supporting a quiet zone. She noted there has been a substantial increase in train traffic already, and if the Port of Oakland expansion occurs it will increase 200-300%. She asked whether the measuring of train noise included actual visits to the furthest distances impacted. Mr. Fox said no, the drawings showing the areas impacted were based on information obtained by the manufacturer. Ms. Raifsnider said she lived in one of the further out areas, and sometimes it is impossible to carry on a conversation due to the noise of the train horn. She asked the Council to continue its investigation into establishing a quiet zone even if implements the use of wayside horns in the meantime.

Tim Cuny shared information with the Council about the health and safety impacts from noise pollution. He asked whether using barriers on one side of the Berrellessa crossing could reduce the cost estimate. Mr. Fox agreed that would be an option that could be analyzed. Mr. Cuny noted that the actual cost could be less, given the 33% added for contingency. Mayor Schroder confirmed that the Council will continue to review the options even if the wayside horns are used in the interim. Vice Mayor DeLaney stated that her intention to use wayside horns was only for a temporary solution.

Dick Duncan agreed that wayside horns could provide good and quick relief from the noise, so he asked the Council not to rule that out. He also commented that the curved nature of the track route is one reason that the sound carries further than necessary, and if the engineers will wait to blow their horns closer to the intersections it won't reach as many unaffected areas. He expressed appreciation to Vice Mayor DeLaney for continuing to address this issue and was optimistic that a solution to the problem is possible.

Seeing no further speakers, Mayor Schroder closed public comment on Items #1-#7 and #9-#17 of the Consent Calendar.

Assistant City Attorney Veronica Nebb requested that Council incorporate the amended resolution for Item #6 of the Consent Calendar that is on the dais. The revised resolution is correcting two typographical errors which are highlighted.

On motion by Michael Menesini, Councilmember, seconded by Janet Kennedy, Councilmember, approving Items #1 through #7 and #9 through #17 of the Consent Calendar and approving Item #6 as amended. Motion unanimously passed 5 - 0.

Vice Mayor Lara DeLaney expressed appreciation for the additional federal stimulus funds that the City will receive, and she asked that a letter be written to thank the city of Concord. She also recommended that the subsequent savings from infrastructure projects be applied toward local streets and roads improvement projects, and she asked whether that will increase the projected schedule of upcoming projects. Mr. Tucker confirmed that the project budget was adjusted, and staff will bring back more information when the CIP projects are presented. He confirmed that letters will be sent.

Mayor Schroder asked about the project timeline, and Mr. Tucker briefly commented on the extended rainy season this year but indicated it should be finished by the end of this year.

Vice Mayor DeLaney asked if project information and updates are posted on the City's website, and Mr. Tucker said yes.

Mayor Schroder opened public comment on Item #8 of the Consent Calendar.

Mike Alford said it is good that the City is getting more money for the Marina Vista project, since one contractor didn't know there were pipes underneath and some of the materials had to be sent back and replaced. Mr. Tucker acknowledged there were some problems, but some redesigning was done to reduce the number of storm drains necessary, so there shouldn't be additional money required. Mr. Alford asked why someone who bid on a project didn't know the details of what was underground. Staff responded that although they had some information, due to the age of the City's infrastructure, all the details might not be available until digging starts. Mr. Alford briefly commented on the impacts of increased traffic on the senior residents of Berrellesa Palms.

Seeing no further speakers, Mayor Schroder closed public comment on Item #8 of the Consent Calendar.

On motion by Mark Ross, Councilmember, seconded by Michael Menesini, Councilmember, to approve Resolution No. 054-10 accepting a transfer of \$629,299 of American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) funds from the City of Concord to the City of Martinez's Marina Vista Streetscape Project (Account No. C1025) and reimburse the City of Concord \$80,205 from the local funds in Account No. C1025. Motion unanimously passed 5 - 0.

PUBLIC HEARING(S)

18. Michael Chandler, Senior Management Analyst, presented the staff report, discussing the goals and purpose of the CaliforniaFirst Program. He also mentioned other cities in the county that have adopted similar programs.

Mayor Schroder expressed appreciation for the presentation, indicating he thought this would be a great program for homeowners. Councilmember Ross said he also thought it was a great program at many levels. He was concerned, however, about the use of public funds for hiring contractors that will be repaid by the homeowner. He questioned whether the competency of the workers would be verified and if they would be paid the prevailing wage.

Mike Marcus of Renewable Funding, LLC said that the Department of Energy guidelines say it is not subject to prevailing wage requirements for residential projects. He added that the fees paid in by the City will go to cover legal and bond costs and do not go to the property owner to cover construction costs; otherwise it would be subject to the prevailing wage restriction.

Mayor Schroder asked whether the City can request local contractors be used. Mr. Marcus said some jurisdictions have offered incentives to local contractors to offset the cost of the required training, or incentives to property owners to offset application costs through a parallel program. He also stated that instituting a requirement for local contractors to be used could be done at the county or regional level.

Councilmember Kennedy asked how long the program would be available. Mr. Marcus said the California Statewide Communities Development Authority (CSCDA) considers it to be a program that will run in perpetuity, and there is close to a billion dollars in funding available. Councilmember Kennedy asked, and Mr. Marcus confirmed there is a strict quality assurance/control process to ensure that applicants are getting the necessary permits and are financially able to meet the requirements. Councilmember Kennedy noted that usually projects with 1-4 units are exempt from prevailing wage standards, but when there are more than 4 units, it is required.

Mr. Vince also noted that the only portion considered "public funding" is \$12,500.

Vice Mayor DeLaney expressed strong support for the program, as it will increase jobs and use clean energy. She thought it could also be a way to enable undergrounding of utilities.

Mayor Schroder opened and closed the public hearing, with no speakers coming forward.

Councilmember Menesini agreed that this is a program that addresses environmental issues with less air pollution, provides additional jobs and gives homeowners a mechanism to improve their homes, which will increase property values.

On motion by Mark Ross, Councilmember, seconded by Lara DeLaney, Vice Mayor, to approve Resolution No. 072-10 authorizing the City of Martinez to join the CaliforniaFIRST Program; and authorizing the California Statewide Communities Development Authority to accept applications from property owners; and conduct contractual assessment proceedings; and levy contractual assessments within the territory of the City of Martinez; and authorizing related actions. Motion unanimously passed 5 - 0.

CITY MANAGER

19. City Manager Comment(s)/Update(s)/Report(s).

CHIEF OF POLICE

20. Chief of Police Comment(s)/Update(s)/Report(s).

Chief of Police Tom Simonetti commented on the discussion earlier in the meeting about the fence in back of the Police Department. Chief Simonetti stated that the project is completed, and he showed the Council and the public the changes made. He indicated that the gate has Paul Starzyk's badge number (98) on it because the contractor felt it was important that he be remembered by all the Officers in the Department. He also noted that the reverse side of the gate has the City emblem, which was added at no additional charge. He reported that the lot has low energy lighting and is wired to have electric gates (however that would have been more expensive than the entire project), which perhaps can be purchased in the future.

Councilmember Menesini expressed appreciation for the new gate, which he thought was tastefully done and increases the security of the lot.

Vice Mayor Lara DeLaney requested that a letter be sent thanking the contractor for a job well done and for the memorial to Officer Staryzk.

APPOINTMENTS TO COMMISSIONS AND/OR AGENCIES

CITY COUNCIL

21. City Council Comments.

Councilmember Ross requested an update on the 4th of July activities in Martinez. Mayor Schroder stated that there would be a parade at 10:00 a.m., pancake breakfast at the Senior Center, and fireworks at dusk.

Vice Mayor Lara DeLaney stated that she will be attending the League of California Cities Policy Committee for Employee Relations on Friday, June 18th, in Sacramento. She encouraged everyone to attend the 4th King of the County Barbecue this Saturday and Sunday (June 19th-20th). Councilmember Ross stated that he was in Del Mar this weekend with his parents who were invited to the Purina Agility Trials. His father, Gene Ross, took third in his competition, and his mother did well in her competition. He noted that the event will be televised.

Mayor Rob Schroder also congratulated the class of 2010 and expressed Happy Father's Day to all fathers.
