

**CALL TO ORDER - PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE - ROLL CALL**

Mayor Schroder called the meeting to order at 7:07 p.m. in the Council Chambers.

PRESENT: Janet Kennedy, Councilmember, Michael Menesini, Councilmember, Mark Ross, Councilmember, Lara DeLaney, Vice Mayor, and Rob Schroder, Mayor.

EXCUSED: None.

ABSENT: None.

**PRESENTATION(S)/PROCLAMATION(S)**

- A. Proclamation Park and Recreation Commemorating July 2010 as Parks and Recreation Month.

Mayor Schroder presented Chair Dylan Radke and Vice Chair Katherine Hern of the Parks, Recreation, Marina and Cultural Commission with the Proclamation. Mr. Radke commented on the support of Martinez residents for parks and recreation programs, as evidenced by the passing of Measures O and H in recent years. He thanked the Mayor and Council for their support.

- B. Marina Presentation by AnchorQEA.

Joshua Burman and Katie Chamberlin conducted a PowerPoint presentation providing an update on the Marina. He reviewed the evaluation done of the disposal ponds, noting it was time to dredge and remove sediment and discussed proposed pond improvements. He also discussed the biological resources survey, which identified the presence of Pickle Weed and the federally-endangered Salt Marsh Harvest Mouse, the marina basin dimensions and layout, and the evaluation of the breakwater that shows the wall is in very bad shape with gaps, holes, and that the easternmost part of the wall is too low. He concluded with a review of repair/rebuild categories, agency coordination, and future action.

Councilmember Ross asked how the new configuration will affect the number of slips, compared with the original proposal. Mr. Burman said less than ten - only those that were conflicting with the launch ramp. He added, however, that there would be new slips in different locations to offset these.

Councilmember Ross asked how long it would take to do the level 1 and 2 surveys; Mr. Burman said a week to ten days, but to get the analysis back could take another month.

Councilmember Menesini commented on the configuration of the entrance, and he asked for a comparison with Benicia's marina and why this configuration was decided upon. Mr. Burman said it has to do with the predominant direction of the winds and currents. He clarified, however, that the design could change between now and construction.

Vice Mayor DeLaney noted it would have been helpful to have a copy of the report prior to the meeting. Vice Mayor DeLaney asked for an explanation of a "biometric survey", and Mr. Burman explained it was a way of using sonar to develop a map of the ocean floor.

Vice Mayor DeLaney also asked how long it will be until some actual progress is made - noting there has been many years of discussion and analysis, but nothing concrete yet. Recreation Manager Mitch Austin said hopefully construction can begin in the summer of 2011. He indicated more information would be presented at the July 21st meeting.

Vice Mayor DeLaney asked if any consideration had been given to the impacts of sea level rise. Mr. Burman said, yes, his firm is very knowledgeable in that regard. Vice Mayor DeLaney asked, and Mitch confirmed, that the Master Plan includes adding a fuel facility.

Mr. Burman noted that the problem is going well, and the pre-construction process is 95% finished.

Vice Mayor DeLaney requested a copy of the PowerPoint presentation. Mr. Austin indicated that copies would be provided to the Council.

C. Presentation by BART Board Member Joel Keller.

Mr. Keller announced BART's new pilot program, "Operation Iraqi Freedom", which offer a free \$50 Transit Ticket to use BART for all active duty military personnel on leave. He indicated that all a veteran has to do is present a DA Form 31, Military ID, and apply at the Customer Service Center at the Lake Merritt BART Station; for further information call (510) 464-7136. If getting to Oakland is an inconvenience, he noted that people can contact him directly, and/or BART can make arrangements to do something here in Contra Costa County.

Mayor Schroder requested that staff provide the information to the Veterans Commission, VA Hospital and the County Veterans Office. Councilmember Menesini suggested that BART extend their services to veterans who are on fixed income and to the injured veterans who have been separated from active duty, and he recommended that they set up something at the VA Martinez Clinic.

Vice Mayor DeLaney encouraged the program to be made available to all Veterans. Mr. Keller stated that he would bring the Council's suggestions back to the Board.

## **PUBLIC COMMENT**

Doug Stewart, Pacheco Homeless Outreach, provided the Council with an update on the services provided in the last month: four people placed in shelters, four referred for mental health evaluation, rides given to inmates, two referrals to Adult Protective Services, two in detox, and two in the new respite center. He noted that the numbers in Martinez are mild compared with surrounding cities, which shows the City and police department are doing something right.

Mayor Schroder expressed his appreciation to Mr. Stewart and his group, as did Councilmember Menesini (especially for connecting people with needed services).

Marty Ochoa, Chair of the Board of the Chamber of Commerce, reported on a successful "King of the Barbecue" event. He complimented the City Council for a wonderful staff. He expressed his appreciation to City Manager Phil Vince, Chief of Police Tom Simonetti, and Public Works Director Dave Scola for all the support. Mr. Ochoa congratulated Leanne Peterson, Main Street Martinez, for a terrific 4th of July event.

Mike Alford reported on an attack that happened at Safeway, concerns of gang violence and other problems facing the City. He stated that the safety of the people is very important and needs to be addressed.

Vice Mayor DeLaney expressed concern about the proposed salaries, and the amount of the proposed increases. She said she would like more details on the cities surveyed.

Mike Alford questioned why the City is even considering these raises, given the current economic times. Mayor Schroder clarified that new job classifications are being created. Mr. Alford reiterated his concern it is an inappropriate time to raise salaries for City positions, either existing ones or new ones.

Seeing no further speakers, Mayor Schroder closed public comment on the item.

Councilmember Ross added that these changes constitute expansion of the scope of work for some positions.

City Engineer Tim Tucker presented the staff report. He indicated that the Resolution overruling protests was not needed since none had been filed.

Phillip Ciaramitaro asked for clarification on the resolution "overruling protests." Mr. Tucker said it referred to any residents of the district filing a protest, of which there were none.

Seeing no further speakers, Mayor Schroder closed the public hearing.

Vice Mayor DeLaney asked why only one of the districts has a CPI-adjusted rate increase. Mr. Tucker explained that the older districts did not have provision for making increases based on the CPI. He also noted that this district had some additional improvements made, resulting in a small increase to the monthly fee.

Councilmember Ross said that next time he would like to see the budgets for the various districts.

## **CITY MANAGER**

16. Discussion of Economic Stimulus Package Components to encourage new development and rehabilitation projects. [P.Vince/09.01.00]

City Manager Phil Vince presented the staff report, discussing possible ways to stimulate development projects in the City, including work on unreinforced masonry buildings.

Mayor Schroder clarified that the proposed fee waiver would apply to projects already approved but not built. He also noted that there would be no impact on the City's budget if no one takes advantage of the incentives. Mr. Vince commented on the intangible benefits to the City, in spite of the potential loss of revenue through the fee waivers.

Assistant City Attorney Veronica Nebb discussed how to define projects "not yet built," and she suggested restricting it to projects that have had no building permit issued.

Vice Mayor DeLaney acknowledged that tax rebates, tax breaks or tax credits can stimulate activity, as evidenced by the recent federal tax credit for home buyers. She noted that the conversation originally began with a discussion as to how to encourage residential development in the downtown, but details such as whether to include commercial development, whether to include all areas of the City and what form the credits should take still need to be settled. She thought that regardless of how it works out, any development that results will benefit the City.

Councilmember Menesini said he supported the concept as well, although the details still need to be settled. He said there needs to be a clear "sunset" provision included in the ordinance, and he would favor a shorter period of applicability.

Vice Mayor DeLaney indicated she thought the credit should be need-based. Councilmember Menesini agreed, as long as the standards for eligibility are clear and consistent. He also said he thought the unreinforced masonry (URM) buildings should be a target for the program, given public safety and economic issues. Mr. Vince discussed marketing strategies for the URM building owners, and Vice Mayor DeLaney said she thought it should be marketed to all groups, not just URM owners.

Councilmember Kennedy discussed some differences of opinion among the Subcommittee regarding the area of applicability and the type of project. She said she would personally recommend Alternative A, since it has a broader application. Mayor Schroder said he tended to agree with Alternative A as well.

Councilmember Ross commented on the potential length of the period for which the City is considering offering the program. He questioned whether applicants who come in at the end of the eligibility period would still qualify. Mr. Vince clarified that the full period would allow time to complete the projects, and last-minute applicants would not have time to complete so they would not be eligible.

Councilmember Ross questioned whether offering the incentive for a limited time was necessary - if the City can afford to offer the assistance, he thought it should do so. He was doubtful whether it would draw very many applicants. Mr. Vince indicated that the marketing of the program would make the limitations clear. Councilmember Ross noted that a developer might also look at the City's available staffing and project processing time, not just the fees. He asked whether expedited processing would be possible. Mr. Vince said not at this time, although they are reviewing the process to see if there are more efficient ways to accomplish the tasks.

Councilmember Ross said he preferred Alternative A, especially the potential assistance for URM projects. There was some discussion about the percentage of the fee waiver; and he expressed preference for 75% rather than 50%.

Mayor Schroder reminded the Council that there had been an extensive process in setting the City's fees, because there needs to be a nexus between the cost of service and the amount charged. He wanted to be sure it was clear that the current fees are not unjustifiable even if the Council decides to lower them temporarily.

Councilmember Menesini noted that the fees charged are a necessary part of doing business, especially in this economy. He was confident that the level of service could be maintained even with this proposed incentive, given the reduction in projects currently. He thought this was a good proposal, and he supported Alternative A.

Vice Mayor DeLaney commented that even if the incentive is 75% rather than 50% for URM projects, the cost to the City won't be unbearable, especially because not everyone will take advantage of the offer. Mr. Vince acknowledged the City could likely bear the cost even at 75%.

Ms. Nebb recommended that the end of the program be tied to completion of the application, rather than "through the application process," since it is difficult to control all time constraints. She also expressed concern about "need-based" qualifications so that there is no discretionary authority.

There was further discussion between the Council and staff as to how best to administer the program and whether it should or could be need-based, especially considering that the URM building upgrades are required of the property owners by law.

Mayor Schroder opened public comment on the item.

Phil Ciaramitaro said he thought the URM improvements should begin with the Sharkey building. He thought it would be irresponsible to sell the building without taking care of the URM aspects or removal of hazardous materials. It will also show a level of confidence in the future success of the downtown, and it could also serve as an anchor project. He asked about the possibility of beginning a facade beautification program, and he thought the City should make sure that the public facilities are well-maintained and repaired.

Dick Duncan reminded the Council that the town has been in a downward spiral for a long time, as evidenced by the low number of new single-family home development applications recently. He noted that having a strong downtown residential area will benefit the downtown businesses and stimulate new businesses. He also commented on the extensive cost of permits and fees that face a developer before he even starts to build. He suggested a waiver of all City fees for downtown residential projects. He agreed that the marketing of the program is critical to its success, as well as streamlining the process.

Mike Alford commented on the number of vacant housing units in the town, and he questioned the advisability of adding more new units. He also commented on the City's responsibility to maintain the infrastructure and retrofit City-owned properties.

Seeing no further speakers, Mayor Schroder closed public comment on the item.

Mayor Schroder disagreed with Mr. Duncan regarding the waiver of all fees for residential projects. He recommended going ahead with Alternative A, with close monitoring to see how effective it is.

Vice Mayor DeLaney acknowledged that the impetus for the measure was to encourage single-family development in the downtown. She encouraged the Council to add a reduction in engineering and plan check fees for single-family housing in the downtown.

Councilmember Kennedy expressed concern about potential discrimination in offering incentives to one particular housing type only, as well as to only offering it for one area.

Councilmember Menesini commented on the need to define what constitutes the downtown and what single-family, owner-occupied dwellings include.

Councilmember Ross said he thought the incentives should be offered across the board, to all areas and all types of projects. Mayor Schroder agreed it would be simpler.

The Council directed staff to develop Alternative A and bring it back to Council for further discussion and/or adoption. Mr. Vince noted that some projects, such as Court Street and the Zocchi building will need to be considered on a case-by-case basis.

17. City Manager Comment(s)/Update(s)/Report(s).

City Manager Philip Vince reported that the Council Economic Subcommittee will be meeting on July 9th to discuss 630 Court Street, and on July 23rd to discuss the Zocchi building. He discussed some project possibilities for the two locations, noting there has been a lot of interest in the downtown recently. He also updated the Council on discussions with Caltrans to consider putting photo-voltaic covers on all the parking spaces to help with the O & M costs for the Delta Research project and the other Zocchi property.

## **CHIEF OF POLICE**

18. Chief of Police Comment(s)/Update(s)/Report(s).

Chief of Police Tom Simonetti updated the Council on the Police Clerk Dispatcher recruitment indicating that 7 of the 8 Dispatcher positions are now filled. Chief Simonetti provided an update on the pending verdict in Los Angeles: Martinez has four officers that have been assigned to the Sheriff Mobile Field Force Team, and they are currently on standby.

## **APPOINTMENTS TO COMMISSIONS AND/OR AGENCIES**

### **CITY COUNCIL**

Mayor Schroder presented the staff report.

Mayor Schroder opened and closed public comment on the item, with no speakers coming forward.

On motion by Lara DeLaney, Vice Mayor, seconded by Mark Ross, Councilmember, to approve the creation of a California Center Delta Research and Education (CCDRE) Standing Subcommittee. Motion unanimously passed 5 - 0.

B. Consider Council appointments to the CCDRE Standing Subcommittee.

On motion by Rob Schroder, Mayor, no second required to approve appointment of Vice Mayor DeLaney and Councilmember Kennedy to the CCDRE Standing Subcommittee. Motion unanimously passed 5 - 0.

20. City Council Comments.

Councilmember Michael Menesini congratulated the Police Department for job well done in controlling the 4th of July celebration. He indicated that the event was well organized and suggested that in the future the celebration can take place at the Waterfront as before.

Councilmember Mark Ross echoed Councilmember Menesini's comments.

Vice Mayor Lara DeLaney also expressed appreciation to City staff and all those involved the parade and 4th of July event. She announced a Public Safety Subcommittee meeting on Monday, July 12, at 6:00 p.m. in the Council Chambers; and Pacheco Annexation meeting on Tuesday, July 13, at 6:00 p.m. in the Council Chambers; and a Hidden Valley Neighborhood Meeting on July 14, at 7:00 p.m. at Hidden Valley Elementary.

Councilmember Janet Kennedy stated she was out of town, but heard wonderful comments about the 4th of July event.

Vice Mayor DeLaney requested that letters of appreciation be given to the organizations who helped sponsor the fireworks (Praxair, Allied Waste Services, and Shell Oil).

Mayor Rob Schroder thanked Leanne Peterson and Main Street Martinez, for putting on the 4th of July Parade. He commented that he and Lara rode in the Parade, and he discussed the visibility of fireworks from Martinez, as well as Benicia seeing Martinez fireworks. Mayor Schroder also commented that he had heard on the radio that the financing for the Energy Efficiency Program that the City just joined is in jeopardy because Fannie May and Freddie Mac do not want to guarantee the loans. It seems that this program is tied to a lien paid by taxes, and the lien must be paid off before it can be refinanced. He expressed optimism that the issue will be resolved.

Vice Mayor DeLaney stated that she just became aware that she had voted on the June 2nd minutes, and was in fact absent for that meeting, and should have abstained.

Assistant City Attorney Veronica Nebb stated that Council can reconsider that item, and Vice Mayor DeLaney can abstain.

On motion by Michael Menesini, Councilmember, seconded by Janet Kennedy, Councilmember, reconsider Item #1 of the Consent Calendar approving the City Council Minutes of June 2, 2010. Motion unanimously passed 5 - 0.

On motion by Michael Menesini, Councilmember, seconded by Janet Kennedy, Councilmember, to approve City Council Minutes of June 2, 2010. Motion unanimously passed 4 - 0.
